### Founders Day – St George's Cathedral

The Feast Day of St Angela Merici was the ideal opportunity to bring the whole school together for Mass something that has not been done for over 25 years.



It was very fitting to be together as a whole school with the launch of the Ursuline Education Community (UEC). This has been running in all 8 Ursuline schools in England since September 2019.

At the core of the UEC is the Ursuline Student Profile. The profile includes ten virtues and all schools started by working on the first - 'United in Harmony'. This term, St Ursula's moved to the second virtue - 'Grateful and Generous'.

Being together as a whole school was a huge celebration and a culmination of 'United in Harmony' and 'Grateful and Generous'. As a celebration of our multicultural community together, and our worldwide Ursuline family, 67 national flags were processed at the start of the Mass, and laid at the altar rail. ## Year 11 visit to 'Hitler on Trial'



24th January 2020

On Friday 24<sup>th</sup> January fifty Year 11 students went to the Streatham Space Project Theatre for the annual 'Hitler on Trial' exam workshop and theatrical production. This included exam tips from examiners, and historian Josh Brooman, in which the students had to act as examiners and judge examples of work. They were also asked to be chief examiners and correct the marking of their peers.

GCSE student Rosalie B said, "It helped us to understand how questions are marked and gave us a chance to improve source question technique." Paris J added, "We realised you don't have to write six pages to get a good mark in the new history exams."

After the interval, actors played the parts of Hitler, Otto Strasser, Albert and propaganda a photographer, amongst others, and



put Hitler on trial for causing World War II. This links with the AQA History Paper 1 that Year 11 will be sitting this summer, as both 'Nazi Germany' and 'International relations from 1919-39' were covered extensively throughout the afternoon.

The prosecuting and defence attorneys then presented their findings and examined cross witnesses. Scarlett M commented, "It made me think carefully about my preconceptions of the 1930's."

At the end, the students had to play the part of the jury and decide if Hitler was guilty or innocent. St Ursula's narrowly found him guilty, but were surprised by the twist at the end, when an actor assassinated Hitler! As Sarah P remarked, "It was an unexpected and dramatic turn of events!"

It was an enjoyable and useful day that will make those involved think in more detail about the events of 1919-1939 and benefit Year 11 with their revision.

#### Pupils at St Ursula's make progress that is 'Well Above Average'

Each pupil has a different starting point and many factors can influence their attainment. At St Ursula's Convent School there is a celebration of pupils' achievements at all level of attainment. In 2019 12% of our pupils achieved an average of two GCSE grades better than expected across all of their GCSE subjects. We also celebrated the achievements of three pupils who gained three grades better than expected.

Our school was delighted to learn that out of the 500 girls in England, who achieved seven or more grade 9s in their GCSEs in 2018, four pupils were at St Ursula's.

The figures for 2019 have yet to be published but St Ursula's have continued in this tradition with 8% of all grades achieved being a 9. Three girls in 2019 also achieved seven or more Grade 9s.

Isabel and Elena achieved 21 GCSE Grade 9s between them this summer!



The Department for Education will be publishing their final performance tables on Thursday 6th February and we are very excited to see the hard work by all staff and students reflected once again in these figures!

### PRE PUBLIC EXAMINATIONS (PPEs) start 11th February 2020

#### PPEs for Year 11s will run from 11th February until 11th March 2020.

Starting with the MFL Speaking, Music and Drama exams before half term, the PPEs provide excellent preparation for the summer GCSEs and give students and teachers valuable information about current levels of performance, strengths and areas for improvement. We are hopeful that it will also help pupils to prioritise their revision more effectively.





#### The PPE 2 Timetable is available on the school website.

Pupils were issued with the Joint Council for Qualifications (JCQ) Information for Candidates for Written Examinations last year and this information should be studied carefully again by all pupils, parents and carers to ensure that the rules and regulations of the PPEs are fully understood. This is also available on the school website.

#### REMEMBER...



- You must not communicate with any pupil in the exam room. "Communication" is not just talking – you must not attract another pupil's attention, turn around in your seat or distract anyone in the exam room.
- Your pockets must be empty no notes, tissues, purses, oyster cards, lip balms or mirrors. Your possessions will be locked up safely before your exam.
- If you are wearing a watch, you must remove this before your exam, and place it on your desk. Watches must not be 'smart', have connection to the internet or have alarms.
- Small water bottles must be clear, contain water only and have all labels removed.
- You must on time for your exams check when you need to register and where you need to be if you are unsure.

If these rules are not followed in your GCSEs you could be reported to the awarding body so ask now if you are unsure about anything before the summer exams!

On Monday we celebrated the feast day of our founder, St. Angela Merici, with a wonderful Mass at St. George's Cathedral. On that day we came together as an Ursuline community: students and staff, both current and past, parents and carers, governors and religious sisters- a community founded upon the vision of a woman who lived over 500 years ago in Renaissance Italy.



St. Angela knew the importance of good quality relationships. Noticing the needs of those around her, she responded with generosity and kindness. For her the most important relationship, that which underpinned all the others, was her relationship with Christ. St. Angela's gaze wasn't fixed on unnecessary things, it was fixed on Jesus. "Happy are those whose hearts God has illumined with the light of truth and who hold on to this world of truth with all their might" (Prologue to the Rule).



It is important that we also see with the light of truth, and not live in the darkness or hide in the shadows. Jesus tells us, "You are a light for the world. A city built on a hill-top cannot be hidden. No one lights a lamp to put it under a tub; they put it on the lamp-stand where it shines for everyone in the house. In the same way your light must shine in people's sight, so that, seeing your good works, they may give praise to your Father in heaven." (Matt.5:14-16)

We know that you give us everything we need and so much more. Help us first to recognise the gifts you have given to us, and to those around us, and be truly grateful for them. 

#### FLOWERS IN LITERATURE:

In the famous novel 'Rebecca' by Daphne du Maurier, the author uses the bushes of rhododendron surrounding the house Manderly to symbolise the dominant personality of Rebecca, the previous wife of the man the protagonist has married. The imagery is violent and atmospheric, foreshadowing events to come:

Suddenly I saw a clearing in the dark drive ahead, and a patch of sky, and in a moment the dark trees had thinned, the nameless shrubs had disappeared, and on either side of us was a wall of colour, blood-red, reaching far above our heads. We were amongst the rhododendrons. There was something bewildering, even shocking, about the suddenness of their discovery. The woods had not prepared me for them. They startled me with their crimson faces, massed one upon the other in incredible profusion, showing no leaf, no twig, nothing but the slaughterous red, luscious and fantastic, unlike any rhododendron plant I had seen before. I glanced at Maxim. He was smiling. 'Like them?' he said. I told him 'Yes,' a little breathlessly, uncertain whether I was speaking the truth or not, for to me a rhododendron was a homely, domestic thing, strictly conventional, mauve or pink in colour, standing one beside the other in a neat round bed. And these were monsters, rearing to the sky, massed like a battalion, too beautiful I thought, too powerful; they were not plants at all."


