Feast of St. Angela Merici

Wednesday 27th January, the Feast of St. Angela Merici, is a special day for all of us who belong to the Ursuline Community. In 1535 St. Angela founded the Company of St. Ursula in Brescia, Italy; a group of women dedicated to serving the Church through education of girls. Almost 500 years later, we continue to be inspired by her example and her words. Last year we celebrated with a whole school Mass at St. George's Cathedral. This year most of us are confined to our homes – what a difference a year makes!

However, in the spirit of St. Angela, an afternoon of feast day activities took place via Google Meet and Google Classroom. The celebrations began with reflections on the life of St. Angela, produced by members of the student Chaplaincy Team and a recorded Feast Day Mass celebrated by Fr. Kevin at Our Ladye Star of the Sea. Thereafter years 7 – 9 reflected upon Pope Francis' writings about global issues as well as designing and decorating a St. Angela Cross based upon the UEC virtues. Year 10 and 11 took part in a workshop entitled 'Giving a voice to the voiceless'.



We can be sure that St. Angela continues to guide us as we continue to find our way through these challenging times. Her words, as always, have great relevance for today's world.


Summary:








PixL Vocabulary App

Pupils in KS3 regularly use PiXL Unlock Vocabulary app as a classroom and homework assignment. It is an invaluable vocabulary resource for multiple subjects. This app traditionally uses flash player on web browsers, but as Google are no longer supporting flash, PiXL recommend downloading the app to pupil's home devices instead. This makes it easier to login and negates the need for flash player.



Miss Deegan has posted instruction manuals on how to download the PiXL app in the Library Google Classrooms, if pupils haven't joined their classroom they can get the code from SMHW.

Any pupils who have lost their PiXL login details should contact Miss Deegan in the Library Google Classroom.












Pupil Book Reviews What's popular at STU?

Form 7 Catherine were asked by Ms Cahalane, English Department, to write to advise other students how to handle Lockdown Learning.

Here is the wonderful advice of Shabeena Antongnanathasan

Firstly, make sure that you are waking up early, (maybe not like a school day but like 15mins later). Get ready and check your google classroom/SMHW for any homework and try to complete it that very day. Make sure to submit your work. If you complete your work that very day it was posted, (unless the teacher gives you the homework in addition for 1 or more lessons), it will help you concentrate and not get stressed so much about not completing the work your teacher gave you. It will make your homelearning life at home more relaxing, calm and better than before. However, you must complete your work by the deadline.

Try very much not to stress yourself over your work making sure that you take your break time and lunchtime breaks. Don't keep on looking at the computer/chromebook/ipad/phone whatever device that you are using and take breaks from it. If you have any questions make sure to ask your teacher, (but not at times like 3:00 in the morning). If you have Google Meet lessons make sure to join, (if you can but best if you do), so the lesson will be more easy to understand as your teacher goes through it with you and answers your questions. You need to complete your work for all your lessons and make sure that you try your very best at all times.

Last but not least, make the best of your home-learning experience. You never know what good things that might happen. You need to be grateful for all the live lessons you have and how your school still manages to give your education as there are millions of boys and girls yearning for education but just can't afford to have it.
