Twice weekly testing over the October half-term

Thank you for your continued support with Covid-19 home testing. We know how important it is for you to be able to send your children to school.

You should encourage your children to continue testing and <u>report</u> results twice a week, at home, throughout the October half-term school holiday and make sure your child takes a test before returning to school. All results should be reported, even if your result is negative or void.

Your children should have enough test kits for the half-term break. You can help them to take the test and report their results. Testing is free of charge. If you do still require more home testing kits to continue testing over half term, you can also order more <u>online</u> through gov.uk or collect from your local pharmacy.

By testing your child twice a week over half term, you will help us to reduce transmission of Coronavirus, keep children in school at St Ursula's and the [name of setting] open to minimise disruption to their education and to you and your household.

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Gospel reading - Sunday 24th October


Mark 10: 46-52 - Jesus heals blind Bartimaeus

'As Jesus left Jericho with his disciples and a large crowd, Bartimaeus (that is, the son of Timaeus), a blind beggar, was sitting at the side of the road. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout and to say, 'Son of David, Jesus, have pity on me.' And many of them scolded him and told him to keep quiet, but he only shouted all the louder, 'Son of David, have pity on me.' Jesus stopped and said, 'Call him here.' So they called the blind man. 'Courage,' they said 'get up; he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?' 'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him, 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road'.

Reflectin

A relationship with Jesus allows us to have the courage to believe in times of need and in times of fulfillment. Bartimaeus is a blind man seeking to be able to see again. He confides in Jesus to make that happen. He shows his faith by stepping up and calling for Jesus to heal him. He shows courage in being able to approach and ask for something so grand. He shows that he believes in a higher power and he trusts that he will be taken care of.

In this passage, we learn about the importance of having the courage to ask for help. Asking for help in a time of need takes courage and risk. In this passage, Bartimaeus could have stayed quiet and could have just let the presence of Jesus escape him; he could have let his opportunity to ask for help pass. Jesus, at the end of the passage, lets him know that his faith saved him. It's important to believe in your faith and believe in receiving help or asking for it. Doing so does not make you weak and does not make you seem selfish. It allows you to be open to your faith and believe in something.



Jesus is the way of light, and of healing, so that nothing inside ourselves can block us from receiving the light of God, the light of his love. Lighten our burdens lord, and enlighten our darkness and may we walk in your ways.

PPEs for Year 11s starting Monday 1st November until Friday 19th November 2021

The PPE timetable_is available on the <u>school website</u> and a paper copy was provided to all students this week. This timetable sets out the day and time of each exam including any practical assessments in the first week back after half term.

Year 11 pupils should be aware of our expectations for the PPEs following their exams assembly with Mr Mandalos. If you or your child has any questions, please do contact the school. It is very important that we run these exams in line with the Joint Council for Qualifications (JCQ) <u>Information for Candidates for Written Examinations</u>. This information should be studied carefully by all students, parents and carers to ensure that the rules and regulations of the PPEs are fully understood. More information, including a video highlighting standard JCQ rules and regulations in examinations, is available on the exams section of the <u>school website</u>.

PPEs will be held in the Sports Hall and students not in exams will be in silent study in their normal lesson classrooms. Any students with access arrangements will have these in place and will be spoken to separately by Mrs Ferreira (SENCo) or Mrs Taylor (Exams Officer) to ensure they understand their arrangements.

The JCQ rules include:



- Pupils must be on time for all exams
- Pupils must not take watches, notes, mobile phones, iPods, MP3/4 players, smartwatches into the exam room

• Pupils must not talk, try to communicate with, or disturb other pupils in the exam room

Any pencil cases must be completely clear and see through

• Small, plastic water bottles must be completely clear with any labels removed and contain water only.

What are negative beliefs?

Many people with high exam anxiety can't stop worrying about failing or the consequences of failing. For instance, 'If I fail my GCSEs my whole life will be a failure'. These types of beliefs focus on what you can't do rather than what you can

Replacing negative beliefs with positive beliefs Find a positive, realistic belief that can replace the negative belief.

For instance, if your negative belief is 'I am rubbish at maths' a positive, realistic alternative could be: 'Even if I will never be the best at maths, I will do better if I have a revision plan and stick to it'.

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The key things to remember are that:

-if you suffer from anxiety, replacing negative beliefs can help - some people find it helpful to keep a record of their beliefs - you can become a more confident person with a 'can do' attitude

Stress can be a great motivator for some students, giving them the 'get up and go' that they need to succeed

Other students are indifferent to stress; they can float along without getting affected by stress in a good or bad way

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The key things to remember are that:

- --stress is nothing to be scared of
- -- anxiety is not inevitable
- -- you can learn how to cope more effectively





Stress can be a bad thing for some students, when exam pressures become overwhelming


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Library Poster Competition Winners

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



Black and British: A Short Essential History David Olusoga, Non-Fiction.

When did Africans first come to Britain? Who are the well-dressed black children in Georgian paintings? Why did the American Civil War disrupt the Industrial Revolution? These and many other questions are answered in this essential introduction to 1800 years of the Black British history: from the Roman Africans who guarded Hadrian's Wall right up to the present day.

This Book is Anti-Racist by Tiffany Jewell; illustrated by Aurélia Durand. (2020)

Who are you? What is racism? Where does it come from? Why does it exist? What can you do to disrupt it? Learn about social identities, the history of racism and resistance against it, and how you can use your anti-racist lens and voice to move the world toward equity and liberation. Gain a deeper understanding of your anti-racist self as you progress through 20 chapters that spark introspection, reveal the origins of racism that we are still experiencing and give you the courage and power to undo it. Each chapter builds on the previous one as you learn more about yourself and racial oppression. Exercise prompts get you thinking and help you grow with the knowledge.




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Murder Most Unladylike by Robin Stevens

OVERDUE AND LOST BOOK FEES



The library does not charge overdue fees; however, some books have been overdue for more than a year, and over 1,000 in total are overdue. Pupils have been given printouts of any books that are overdue by more than 30 days. If the book has been lost or irreparably damaged, it should be paid for on ParentPay in the 'Library Fee' section. The cost of the books are on the printout. Arrangements for book swaps can be made if necessary upon request.

A 'Library Fee' section is available in ParentPay and it will show as "£1-£75" on your ParentPay account; this is not a charge, but simply a facility for you to enter your own amount should your child have lost one of the books on the overdue notice. No action is required until you are contacted. You can also use this facility to donate towards the library for book-buying.
