UK Linguistics Olympiad



What is the UKLO?

United Kingdom Linguistics Organasition. <u>UKLO</u> is a competition, like the <u>Mathematical Olympiad</u> or the <u>National Cipher Challenge</u>, for students who are still at school (or equivalent college) - any age, any ability level; but unlike other competitions, our competitors have to solve linguistic data problems. It's completely **free** to both competitors and schools. UKLO also enters at least one team each year in the <u>International Linguistics Olympiad</u>, and in recent years the UK teams have been very successful.

What do I do?

The UK Linguistics Olympiad (UKLO) is a fun but challenging competition for any school-age student interested in language. It is much like the <u>Mathematics Challenge</u>, but with all problem sets taken from language. In a typical UKLO problem, participants see data from one of the world's 7,000 languages and need to work out how a specific aspect of this language works based on these examples. Cracking the code is good for analytical skills, but it also shows participants how fascinating languages are.

Prior to doing the competition we will hold taster sessions and go through examples to practice and understand what will be expected from you.

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Gospel reading - Sunday 16th January

Mark 21:1-12 -Jesus heals the paralysed man

When he returned to Capernaum, some time later word went round that he was in the house; and so many people gathered that there was no room left, even in front of the door. He was preaching the word to them when some people came bringing him a paralytic carried by four men, but as they could not get the man to him through the crowd, they stripped the roof over the place where Jesus was; and when they had made an opening, they lowered the stretcher on which the paralytic lay. Seeing their faith, Jesus said to the paralytic, 'My child, your sins are forgiven.' Now some scribes were sitting there, and they thought to themselves, 'How can this man talk like that? He is being blasphemous. Who but God can forgive sins?' And at once, Jesus, inwardly aware that this is what they were thinking, said to them, 'Why do you have these thoughts in your hearts? Which of these is easier: to say to the paralytic, "Your sins are forgiven" or to say, "Get up, pick up your stretcher and walk"? But to prove to you that the Son of man has authority to forgive sins on earth' - he said to the paralytic-'I order you: get up, pick up your stretcher, and go off home.' And the man got up, and at once picked up his stretcher and walked out in front of everyone, so that they were all astonished and praised God saying, 'We have never seen anything like this.'

Reflection

The story of Jesus healing the paralytic man raises the question of what the theology of work means for those who do not have the ability to work. The paralytic man, prior to this healing, is incapable of self-supporting work. As such, he is dependent on the grace and compassion of those around him for his daily survival. Jesus is impressed by the faith of the man's friends. Their faith is active, showing care, compassion, and friendship to someone who was excluded from both the financial and relational rewards of work. Jesus sees their effort as an act of collective faith. "When Jesus saw *their* faith he said to the paralytic, 'Son, your sins are forgiven'.

We observe three things: (1) work is intended to benefit those who can't support themselves through work, as well as those who can; (2) faith and work are not separated as being and doing, but are integrated into action empowered by God; and 3) work done in faith cries out for a community of faith to support it.
